Port Arthur better choice

IF large scale fish farming is user-friendly to locals and visitors and does not harm the environment, then why are there no fish farms around Port Arthur?

It has a length of 3.7 nautical miles, is 1 nautical mile wide and faces due south towards the great Southern Ocean. The central channel varies from 33m down to 53m in depth. The eastern shore has a 10m depth within 100m of the cliffs along the southern two miles of coastline. Safety Cove would be a safe area for the shorebased infrastructure. A road already exists.

Surely it would be more economical to use this pristine area rather than the pristine Okehampton Bay area. Road access to both areas is similar in length. Port Arthur access has only one steep hill at Eaglehawk Neck whereas Triabunna has Bust Me Gall and Black Charlie's, not to mention Paradise Gorge. The cost of construction of the wharves would be cheaper at Port Arthur as Safety Cove is sheltered whereas Okehampton Bay is open to all southerly weather.

So could the Minister please explain why Okehampton Bay has been chosen over what is obviously a better site?
